An Old Member Tells His Story

I am probably the oldest, in year of age, of our Guild. Being in that position gives me a long memory of how and when I first discovered the smell and feel of wood. It was at Fairview Grammar School near the Alabama State Fairgrounds. The teacher was Mr. Morrow, and all the boys in the manual training class were in awe of his ability to handle hand tools (that was all we had) and create something from wood, such as bread boards and shoe shining boxes. This was in the early '30's, and Mr. Morrow wasn't paid very much at that time in our history, known as the depression. To supplement his income he resorted to moonlighting with a funeral home as a funeral director.

Now the scene is set for what I want to convey to you. It was that long ago that I was drawn to woodworking, and it is a shame the schools do not put any emphasis on crafts any more. My freshman year at Phillips High School I was required to select a minor subject, and I selected woodturning since that was the only woodworking class available. That got me started. The teacher was Mr. Wilshire, and during one of his lectures he admonished that a man is not a man if he doesn't carry a picket knife and I do until this day. In the intervening years I got married, served 38 months in the Navy, went to work for Alabama Power Company and ultimately bought my fourth house where, finally, I had a basement in which I could set up a shop. During this period from high school until 1971 I dreamed of owning a lathe and not being restricted to just a handsaw and a hammer. It didn't take me long to get started—about six months—on building a shop. It was about this time that Sears in downtown Birmingham had a turning demonstration, and I watched it for a while on my lunch hour. When I got back to the office I called the Sears manager, whom I knew, and asked if it would be possible to acquire the lathe that was used in the demonstration. He asked for a few minutes and then called me back to say the manager of the tool department would be expecting me to come get the lathe. Now, get this! I got the lathe, a set of six turning tools, a spur center, a live center and two face plates for \$85. Can you believe that? A friend of mine who could weld made me a bench out of angle irons providing a place to put a sheet of plywood for the top and for a shelf underneath. I was in hog heaven. I think the first thing I turned was a candlestick and the second was a laminated bowl (turning blocks were not available in Birmingham at that time) and I guess you could say the rest is history.

That lathe was used until sometime in the early '80's when I got a Delta lathe with speed control (another period of hog heaven set in). From there it has been a steady advance in power tools. Through the advancement I now have two band saws, a table saw, a jointer/planer, a router table, a drill press, a compound miter saw, a table sanding machine (6"x48"), a 15" planer, a dust collection system (to which the major machines are connected), a scroll saw and finally a new lathe, I got for Christmas last year from WoodCraft. It is a Nova DVR 3000 (Digital Variable Reluctance) with a mini computer, swivel head and speed control, a beauty of a machine.

Needless to say, when I'm not on the golf course (three days a week) I am in my shop. I have made a lot of furniture for our home and would make some more but there isn't room for any more. I am now reduced to making the "little things" the ladies like such as candlesticks, trivets, carvings and stuff like that.

I bet you haven't gotten this far in reading this "tripe" because you probably got bored much earlier. For whatever it may be worth, however, you have my story, such as it is. I am sure many of you can tell a similar story about your progression to a shop that provides untold happiness for you. If you have learned at least one thing from this, I hope it is that no matter what kind of tools and equipment you have, or how much time you have to devote to your work, do as much as you can so that the smell and feel of wood is a constant reminder of why we have the Alabama Woodworkers Guild, the place where you can associate with men and women of like interests.


Homewood Senior Center 816 Oak Grove Road Homewood, AL


