Stick-and-Socket Furniture; Ancient to Contemporary



Kenton Hall, Professor, Department of Art Ball State University, Muncie, Indiana

One-Day Seminar presented to the Alabama Woodworkers Guild

Saturday, June 11 (8:00 AM) At 614 24th Street South, Birmingham

Stick-and-socket joinery was, quite likely, the first and is still one of the most accessible joinery techniques for use in wooden furniture. From surviving ancient Egyptian examples; medieval turners chairs, stools, tables, and spinning wheels; to American Windsor chairs the technique has been widely used on a variety of furniture forms.

The seminar will begin by discussing the technique through images of the above examples and others with the remainder of the day demonstrating modern methods of cutting, fitting, and securing the components of the joint with readily available, inexpensive tools. Chair forms will be discussed in detail. Personal explorations in chair and table forms will also be used as examples.

Wood Carving
Shop Tools/Jigs
Toys
Restored/Refinished Items

The Restored /Refinished items is a new category added this year. It will require before and after photo/photos to assist the judge in his effort with this category. As questions develop we will have other information to clarify the category.

We have had excellent shows in the past and this year should be no different with all of the new talent that has come into the Guild. I encourage everyone to participate, it is a great way to learn and grow woodworking skills.

Financial Report

We're currently operating in the black. Most of our operating capital comes in during the first quarter with annual membership dues coming due each January. We made money on both the Jigs & Fixtures seminar and on the Workbench Class.

We put out a 'comfort bucket' each month for donations to our meeting costs. Our income from the comfort bucket this year has been \$185 with meeting expenses of \$293.

Year to date we have funded three scholarships this year with \$420 left in our scholarship budget. Each month we spend around \$225 printing and postage on our Guild News. As of April month end we had \$3782 in the bank.
