Another Hardwood Supplier

Jerry Ziliak, managing partner of C.A. Hardwoods located in Quitman, MS, wants you to know that this year they have begun stocking a variety of tropical hardwood lumber and burls in their Quitman, MS warehouse. Quitman is about 25 minutes due south of Meridian and approximately 20 miles across the Alabama border into Mississippi.

They have just installed a Laguna LT24x24 bandsaw and are offering project lumber and burls (whole or dimensioned). They can also cut turning squares and blocks for our members. They are offering thin lumber (straight grain and burl) for inlay and are beginning to stock long cants that they will cut into various length short sections on customer request. They are currently preparing a shipment of "short lumber" (4ft and under) as raw material for project woodworkers.

Below is a catalog link. "It is a fair representation of what we have in burl. However, we have over (300) pieces of Honduran Rosewood burl that we have yet to include in this online catalog. We invite your members to visit us anytime Mon-Fri 8:00AM – 5:00PM at 100 N. Railroad Ave. Quitman, MS 39355. Our manager is Tony Herrington and his cell is 601 410-0430. The phone number in the Quitman warehouse is 601 776-1422; fax is 601 776-1433. We will generally operate on Saturday mornings until 1:00PM; however Tony is committed to attend an all day woodturner's exposition in Hattiesburg this Saturday. The best thing to do for any of your guys driving over would be to call and make an appointment with Tony. Your guys are welcome individually or in groups. Our current burl stock in Quitman is approx. 20,000 lbs in 6-7species."

"It is our intention to provide an economically practical source of raw material for small project woodworkers and woodturner/woodcarver artisans. "

Fridays at Woodcraft Group Create Project for Auction

Just in case you think those guys that meet down at Woodcraft and bring their lunch on Fridays are just sitting around eating and jawing, take a look at the table pictured below. This little beauty was put together by the group. They took cherry, donated by **Glenn Phillips** of Dixie Pacific, and built this table. But that isn't the whole story.

The story begins with a series of jigs that the guys built last year led by **Barron Bartlett** and **Buzz Kelly**. They spent a fair amount of time building various and sundry woodworking jigs (several of which now are permanent donations to the shop at Woodcraft). One of those jigs was a taper jig for making tapered table legs.

Buddy Finch came up with a plan to build a small plant stand table. Now I saw that plan and I've got to tell you that this table may be the size of that plan but that's about all. The plan they started with was a very simplistic table with straight legs and plain aprons.

The guys (led by **Barron**) wanted to use their tapering jig so they decided to taper the legs. Next, they decided to use mortise and tenon joinery so that they could practice that skill.

Well, then came a little bead detail on the outside edge of the legs and at the bottom of the apron. Finally, just for good measure, **Buzz** routed the top edge of their table with a beading bit to give it a "finished" look.

Their plan was to have **Dan Browning** spray the table at his lacquer spraying class until **Dan** had to cancel the class unexpectedly. **Dan** has promised that he will spray the table anyway.

What is going to happen to the table then you ask. Well let me tell you. The guys are going to bring their little table to the May Hot Dog supper and auction where it will, hopefully, find a new home.

I have a collection of items I have purchased at the auction over the past few years from a folding table (made by **Jim Lee**) to an end table (courtesy of **John Lawson**) to a wine bottle balancing wedge (by **Bill Shivers**). **Buzz** always buys wood and tools but those hand made items are my favorite. Maybe I will bid on this one too. Can you out bid me and get a chance to take it home with you? Let's see! **Nelda**





Strange Woodworking Tools?

Do you recognize the tools below? Do you think of them as woodworking tools? These were seen on the work bench at the **Kelly** house during a recent class on hand rubbed finishes. **Bob McClure** was a little surprised to learn that he could iron out dents in his woodworking projects with a steam iron.

A small crock pot (the size normally used for serving party dips) is the perfect tool for heating up boiled linseed oil. Jeff Jewtt (renowned finishing expert) recommends heating oil prior to applying it to unfinished wood.
