November 20th Meeting

Our meeting costs for meeting at the Homewood Senior Center went from \$35 per meeting to \$100 per meeting this past year. As a member you get the benefit of monthly meetings, training availability, our monthly <u>Guild News</u>, use of our Woodworking Education Center, as well as the opportunity for fellowship with other woodworkers. I hope you will vote in favor of the increase.
