## August 2014 Program: Ed Bullock

The August 2014 meeting program was about building a wooden music stand, and going with the theme, Jeff Hood brought a music stand for show and tell that he has built. Jeff's music stand is a beautiful piece of work and I hope he enters it in the Annual Show so that more people can see the fine work produced by members of the Guild. The program was about building a



simpler music stand with a turned pedestal and an adjustable tray.

The program went through the various steps in building the music stand beginning with how to glue up a blank that can be turned into the pedestal. The jig used to cut sliding dovetail joints in the pedestal was shown and discussed. The jig is simple to make and is attached to the lathe so that the sliding dovetail joints can be cut on the pedestal while the pedestal is still mounted on the lathe.

Another important jig was shown and discussed. It was the portable router table which presents the bit to the work piece horizontally rather than vertically as in regular router tables. Like the jig for the lathe, this jig is also simple and easy to build. It is used to cut the corresponding dovetail joints on the legs. The same portable router table was used to cut the mortise and tenon joint in 1/2 inch stock for the music tray.

It is a simple project that does not require much material and does not take a lot time to complete. I will be happy to discuss the project in more detail with anyone interested in building a music stand of this type.

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# **Beginning Boards**

In 2011 I was the secretary of the St Pete Woodcrafters Guild in Saint Petersburg, Fl. I was recruiting new members to the guild and working the old members list. I received an email reply back from Mr. RT where he wrote "I ...would like to rejoin...I stopped going because most meetings were directed to the more professional woodworker. Although I enjoyed the info it was far above my skill and desire... I do not want to eliminate the professional but rather see more intermediate programs...I'm sure you could attract some beginners." This email began the idea for this series of articles on my beginnings in woodworking. I am relatively new at woodworking and I want to approach writing to the interests of the beginner and beginning members. I am not totally unlearned in woodworking. I have seen and experienced quite a lot over the years but I am no expert in anything. I just do the best I can and I suspect that goes for many guild members.

#### THE SCROLL SAW

The first tool that I learned to use beyond common house maintenance tools was the scroll saw. My sister, Kricket, introduced me to one and this is where I started to learn to make sawdust for the fun of it. A scroll saw is basically a thin small blade that is tensioned between two parallel reciprocating arms. You guide the cut of the blade along the lines of a pattern and cut. She took a board and drew some wavy lines, some zig-zag lines, some straight lines and some curvy lines. She helped me tension the blade, set the speed for the machine and showed me how to hold it down and guide it along the lines.

I found that the basic moves were pretty easy to perform. I also found that it is pretty easy to break a blade if you don't cut your way through a turn and if you push the blade faster than it's ability to cut. PING! I broke my first blade which costs about 20 cents. Next, she put me on a simple pattern and I cut out a sloppy figure. As I learned, my cuts got better and my abilities improved and then she gave me a pattern with inner cuts and I learned about drilling holes and threading the blade through the hole. More on this next time.

Now, let me explain a few things. There are basically two types of blades. All are 5" long and some have pins through the ends of the blade and some are pin-less. I only use pin-less/ blades so my scroll saws must take pin-less blades. The old pinned blades are a throwback to the old manual coping saw. You can find plenty of old electric coping saws they aren't worth much for fine work. Many people use different blades. I can't begin to name them all but the only blade that I use are Flying Dutchman Blades and I always use "scroll-reverse" style blades. For a good discussion I would recommend reading the RESOURCES listed below.

If you are a member of the Alabama Woodworkers Guild then you have access to a great shop for \$50 a year. Personally, I think that every guild should have a shop. Birmingham learned from Greenville, S.C. and these are the only two guilds that I know of who have their own shops. Birmingham has shop supervisors who will set you up on a machine, teach you the safety plan for the machine and will make you sign a release of responsibility. Then they will teach you to drill a straight hole in a piece of wood to slip the pin-less blade through the hole to make an inner cut. It you don't have access to a shop then you may need to have instruction from a scroller. Many woodworkers have scroll saws and have never used them. Next time we will discuss tensioning and companion tools

for the scroll saw.

The scroll saw is so simple and safe that I could teach a nine year old how to do the basic moves and would be confident that he/she wouldn't hurt themselves. It's pretty simple, "don't put your finger in front of the blade when the machine is on." Some very beautiful work can be done on a scroll saw.

#### RESOURCES

I would highly recommend to start reading at www.mikesworkshop.com He will teach you about scrolling and sell you the best blades. Then I would subscribe to Scrollsawworkshop.blogspot.com and Steve Good will teach you more and share some cool, free patterns with you. He posts about 3 -4 patterns a week and has a huge catalog of patterns. I plug Steve's blog and send him a little cash every so often because he does this for the fun of it. There are hundreds of video's and websites. But these two are the best.


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
# 2014 AWG Annual Show – Rules and Guidelines

- 1. An individual may enter as many items as desired into one or more categories; however, an individual is limited to one 1st, or 2nd, or 3rd place ribbon per category even if the individual enters multiple items in that category and is the only person in that category (Award winning items are still eligible for the People's Choice Award.)
- 2. If an item has won a ribbon in a previous AWG show, it may be entered into the show as "Display Only" and will not be judged.
- 3. If an item has not won any previous ribbons in an AWG show, it may be entered again for either judging or "Display Only".
- 4. Items being entered for judging shall have been made by the individual. Also, all the major pieces of the item will have been made by the individual. Minor parts such as: miscellaneous dowels, hardware, glass panes, wheels and headlights for toys, frets, wires or other small parts produced commercially, may be used in most circumstances. If in doubt, contact the AWG board or Show Chairperson.
- 5. Any item being entered into the show (includes items for judging or "display only") is eligible for the People's Choice Award which is awarded based on the number of votes in the public ballot.
- 6. If an individual wins a 1<sup>st</sup> place blue ribbon in a Beginner, Intermediate, or Advanced skill category, that individual must enter future items in that category at the next higher skill level. (Example: John Doe wins a 1st place ribbon as a Beginner in Traditional Furniture in the 2013 AWG Annual Show. The next time he enters a Traditional Furniture item into an AWG show, he must enter at the Intermediate skill level. The same condition applies for Intermediate and Advanced 1<sup>st</sup> place ribbon winners to advance to the next higher skill level.)
- 7. If there is a question as to which category an item shall be entered in, (ex. Traditional Furniture, Toys, Miscellaneous, etc.) the Show Chairperson shall make the final decision.
- 8. Contemporary versus Traditional furniture:
  - ~ Contemporary furniture design is marked by modern and trendy forms often made with a great deal of attention to the needs of the 21st century lifestyle.
  - ~ Traditional design follows the established and timelessly elegant forms which tend to create a more welcoming and warm atmosphere, Traditional designs often feature elaborate ornamentation which give a home a touch of luxury (examples: Windsor, Queen Anne, Victorian, Chippendale, etc.).
- 9. Entering items into the AWG Annual Show is limited to current (dues paid up-to-date) AWG members and current West Alabama Woodworkers Association (WAWA) guild members.
- 10. Any person entering the 2014 show will have their name placed into a drawing for a \$100 Gift Certificate to the Pelham Woodcraft store. The winning name for the gift certificate will be drawn at the next guild meeting.

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**From 1-65**, take Exit 238 (Highway 31). Turn north on U.S. Highway 31, go 0.6 miles and turn left on State Highway 119 South. Go 3.0 miles south on Highway 119 and turn right on County Highway 12. Go 2.1 miles on Highway 12 until it ends at County Highway 17. Turn right on Highway 17 and the WEC is 0.3 miles on your left. There is a large WEC sign at the entrance.
