# April Pre-Meeting and General Meeting Wrap-up

The Show and Tell portion of the meeting included our very own Dwight Hostetter who shared his hand made maul (called a "Beetle" in timber frame jargon) which he used to erect a treated yellow pine timber frame shelter for his clay oven. He shared photos of the structure being raised. The structure joints were made using tenons and mortises which were then pegged with red oak wooden pegs in lieu of metal fasteners. The Beetle head was made from a lathe turned piece of solid red oak and the handle was turned using white oak.











Dwight also shared a geometric cutting board he created, yet again proving Dwight definitely has an out of the box and creative view of woodworking!



### April Pre-Meeting and General Meeting Wrap-up

President Ray Ziegler also shared the culmination of his efforts to create an 18<sup>th</sup> Century Surgeons Chest. The chest was requested from the Guild by the curators of the American Village who wanted an authentically made period piece for use in their Colonial Life demonstrations. The chest has been crafted using the same hand tools and similar joinery the 18<sup>th</sup> century craftsmen used.





The multi-talented Jim Woodard both played and shared his construction methodology for an all-round favorite Banjo. It was all this writer could do not to get up and dance a jig instead of sawing with one!





Following the structured meeting, the members filed back onto the shop floor and shopped around adding their bids for that one piece of equipment needed to complete the home shop!

### **Introduction to Scroll Sawing Class**




