Among the many "tips" Dale gave us was his preference to finish sanding the outside surface near completion, and then start on the inside. There is less "chatter" this way.

Dale also demonstrated how he sharpens his tools, and emphasized the importance of keeping your chisels sharp. In fact, he even had duplicate knives so that he wouldn't have to stop in the middle of his project to sharpen a dull tool.

Dale's many-facetted talents were also to be appreciated and admired by all in the items be brought for our Show and Tell table.

Two items which were very unique were a walnut and cherry cabinet that featured glass shelves and rosewood appointments, and a delicate three legged table labeled, "Barefoot and Pregnant".


The guild will furnish plates, napkins, utencils, and cups, and drinks.
