



The Deft company was to send a write up of their products to include in this newsletter, but as it had not been received by the time we went to print, it will be printed at a later time when received.


We appreciate the time, effort, and patience of Mr. Lamb in answering our many questions.


SHOW AND TELL...

show.


This show behind us, we will now concentrate on our TOYS FOR TOTS or orgram and make it as, if not more, successful.





OLD OR YOUNG, HOW CAN YOU TELL?

Kerry McCalla, antique tool collector, enlightened us on recognizing certain markings on tools which will determine the date or maker.

Planes are a favorite collection tool for Kerry, and he demonstrated several. Most planes have one, two and sometimes, three stamps on it, dating it. An 18th century plane was more decorative than a 19th century one as the people of that period took more time to make their planes.

Start looking at the front of the plane for a date stamp. Catalogues are available for reference.

The first plane shown was from the Auburn Tool Co., Auburn, N. Y., (not Alabama), was home base for 12 different tool companies at one time.

As observed on a T rabbit plane, the markings are quite small, and one often times needs a magnifying glass to read the markings. As observed on this plane, the markings S. Crowell, Troy, N. Y. were quite plain. This company only made tools for four years, 1828 to 1832.

On American moulding planes, the measurements are marked in 1/8ths. i.e., 2 would be 1/4".

Another noted wooden plane maker of the 19th century was Ken Roberts of New Hampshire, (Anita's home state).

Without a doubt everyone will agree that Kerry has a beautiful and historical collection of antique tools. His joy comes in showing them and giving the background. He's done a marvelous job in making our get togethers even more meaningful.


