TOYS FOR TOTS

Nelson Brooks has "bird dogged" the city hunting a place to auction, or otherwise dispose of, our toys for the most money. As you know, the money is then turned over to the FOP who run the TFT program in Birmingham. He has landed a true gem - The Harbert Center in downtown Birmingham. This is a brand new, gorgeous lobby, luxurious, beautifully decorated and furnished meeting place for civic Bank, corporation and industrial presidents as well as high ranking business executives meet there. On December 1 and 2 we will display our toys in their lobby. Since we can't auction them, we will price them for salebut for any large items which are worth a lot of money, a base price will be placed on them and sealed bids will be accepted for opening on the second day. Should no bids be received in excess of the base price, the item will not be sold and will be returned to the maker.

STUDY CLASSES

Ron Acton and Dr. Armstrong have been consulting with Mr. Alan Craig, of Bessemer State Technical College, about assisting in our classes this year. They have come up with a fine program, one that will certainly meet with your approval. There are two classes - Hobby and Commercial. The details are as follows:

HOBBY

Limited to 20 students (first 20 to pay the Guild member fee of \$45) and if any of the 20 fall out, a waiting list will be invoked. The classes will begin in November and run to May 1988. They will meet on each of the Thursday nights of each month (except Guild meeting night) and will be 3 hours long. Dr. Armstrong will be the instructor.

COMMERCIAL

This will be for experienced craftsmen. They will indicate the subjects, they are interested in, and instructors will be secured. Subjects like form building, stair construction, shaper craft, etc. The Assn. of General Contractors will supply some of the instructors. The cost for this course for Guild members is \$75 (\$95 for non-Guild), and classes will be held at Ronnie's each Tuesday night, November thru May.

Bessemer Tech. will administered the programs, and checks should be made payable to them. We appreciate Ron making his plant available for the classes again this year. Get your name in the pot promptly.

SHOW AND TELL


