This should be a thoroughly interesting experience, and we know you won't want to miss it.

Last Meeting-January 1999

What a wonderful sight to look out at the turnout for the meeting. There had to be at least 75 in attendance and that should be the minimum each month when you consider the type and quality programs we have. After the usual important announcements, we got into the program. Fred Baker, a member almost from the beginning of the guild in 1983, did one of the things he does best-make dovetails on his Porter-Cable dovetail jig. The first batch dealt with a box of four sides that needed dovetailing if it were going to be a strong and attractive box. He made half-blind dovetails for this box. and as is always the case with Fred, they fit perfectly. The members gathered around the operation for a better look at what he was doing and for a better hearing of what he was saying. Being a former teacher he has the

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knack of clearly and plainly explaining whatever he is doing. After a lot of oohs and aahs over how beautifully the joints fitted, the program was turned over to Mike Key. Mike is no slouch either when it comes to woodworking. Mike and Fred acted as instructors at our last woodworking classes and from all reports they had a successful class. Mike has a Leigh dovetail jig which is capable of making either half-blind or through dovetails. Since Fred had done the half-blind, Mike proceeded to demonstrate the wonders of the Leigh jig. His through 'tails were perfect and drew admiring glances from the membership. Charley Ard had brought his Porter-Cable Omnijig but time had run out for any more demonstrations. However, Fred had his Keller jig with him and quickly showed how he makes through 'tails on it. As an added attraction, Fred displayed his shop made 'tail jig he made from plans in Shop Notes and it was very well made. We appreciate Fred, Mike and Charley making preparations to do the program and going to the trouble to bring their equipment to the meeting. We are so fortunate to have quality members who not only can, but do such a great job of sharing with the rest of us mere mortals.

Member's Shop Visits

The first of our shop visits was held at President Dan's home, and there were 48 of you who made the visit. It was a great surprise to see how clean he had made the shop—made one wonder if he

does any work in it. Just kidding, of course. Dan has a liberal amount of space in his basement. having taken over the parking space of one car and the rest of the basement. He has it arranged so as to be able to flow from one machine to the next one needed with the least amount of delay, a factor all of us could do well to accomplish. 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
