February Meeting Highlights

President Dan Browning called the meeting to order and thanked Jim Lee for picking up doughnuts. Jim Lee was voted permanent doughnut man as he did such an excellent job. Doughnuts were provided by the Guild. Bo Thuston provided the coffee.

Visitors Tom Bowman, James Casner, Harry Kimmel and Charles Farrell (please forgive any misspellings) were recognized as was new member John Lawson.

Maps to Frank Jones' house were passed around for the afternoon shop visit. Names were drawn for the Frank Jones class (see article page 3). The bookcase class taught by Paul Mancill was scheduled to begin February 23rd. There were still 4 slots available on meeting day.

The Marc Adams Router Seminar date was announced as April 13th. (See article page 4.)

Vestavia playground volunteers forms were once again available at the meeting. There will be a garage sale to benefit the playground effort on March 9th. Donations will be accepted on March 8th at the Vestavia Civic Center.

Show-n-tell included a beautiful blanket chest made by Paul Mancill of his own kiln dried cherry with a cedar drawer and bottom. Buddy Finch brought a turned bowl made of multiple woods and a welcome sign made with a scroll saw (though according to Buddy he is no Cliff Daniels). Harry Kimmel brought a toy truck made of oak with a maple hood. And, last but not least, Cliff Daniels showed us (though he is no Buddy Finch) his intarsia quail out of walnut and maple. All are contenders for the quarterly show-ntell prize to be presented in April.

After being briefed on the definition of an expert: a drip under pressure; someone 50 miles or more from home with a briefcase; or someone who can look at a mussed bed and tell if it was for love or money; we were introduced to an expert woodworker.

Bobby Michaelson, told us that he does mostly out of town shows so he can claim to be an expert. From the looks of the examples of his work he brought to show us, I think he might have been pulling our legs.

In addition to the pieces he brought, he showed slides of many more. Bobby has 24 years of experience in woodworking and has been working as a professional woodworker for 18 years. creates his own unique designs, (reminiscent of those of his friend Dale Lewis without feminine legs) often with input from his customers. He says "there are no mistakes just design changes." Bobby shared many of his techniques with us including one of his favorite finish formulas (see page 5). Bobby also spent some time telling us how to apply the finish for the best result. He ended by inviting us all over to his place, Ramwood, at 2127 First Avenue South to visit.

Paul Mancill announced that next month's program will be a portable sawmill. We were then adjourned to eat polish dogs provided at no cost by an anonymous donor before heading on over to visit Frank Jones' shop.

3/8" chisel, #2 gouge 12 to 16 mm #5 gouge 12 to 16 mm #7 gouge 10 to 16 mm riffler files and rasp

Marc Adams Router Workshop

The Alabama Woodworkers Guild is fortunate to have acquired the services of **Marc Adams** in teaching a router workshop.

MARC ADAMS has been woodworking professionally for over 19 years. In 1991, he became a technical consultant to the W.W.P.A., S.F.P.A., A.H.E.C., and the American Government, representing the U.S. on International Quality of Furniture Making.

His work has appeared in DE-SIGN BOOK SIX AND SEVEN, as well as many other national publications. He has worked with the E.P.A. in Washington on current woodworking issues, and has been a panel commentator at the prestigious International Woodworking Fair.

He specializes in veneering, carving and joinery.

Marc has won the Indiana Artist/Craftsman of the year award three times and periodically does TV and radio talk shows on woodworking topics.


He co-authored a book on WORKING WITH PLASTIC LAMI-NATES, and currently consults for both the laminate and adhesive industries.

He lectures nationally for universities, guilds and the WOOD-WORKING SHOWS out of Los Angeles. In 1998 he was chosen as one of Indiana's top 40 under 40 in the local business community.

The router is the most often used and, without a doubt, the most versatile tool in the shop today. In this informative workshop, Marc will distinguish the differences between the trim, general, plunge, and "D" handle routers as well as safety and maintenance.

Students will learn about the large selection of router bits available today and which ones work best for the job at hand. Speed, torque, feed direction and rate will be discussed as well as carbide versus high-speed steel, bit diameter, shaft size, collet types and sharpening.

The majority of the class will be spent showing set-ups for a router table and how to make several fixtures including circle, elliptical, mortise & tenon, cope and stile, mock dovetail, spline, inlay, star bursts, fluted jambs, and many others. The workshop will be held on Saturday, April 13, 2002 from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the Shades Crest Baptist Church in Bluff Park. Lunch will be served.

Cliff Daniels, Shop Host

Cliff Daniels will host our shop visit for March. Cliff, a long time member and previous board member of the Guild, is probably best know for his outstanding scroll saw work.

A master at both fret work and intarsia, perhaps Cliff will share some of his woodworking secrets when we visit his shop.

Located near the Galleria in Hoover, you can get to Cliff's house by taking the Hwy 31 exit from I-459. Go north on Hwy 31 and take a left at the traffic light in front of Crest Cadillac onto Patton Chapel Road. Go approximately 1.5 miles and turn left in front of Hoover Fire Station No. 2 onto Chapel Lane.

Travel Chapel Lane until you get to the stop sign at Al Seier Road. Go to the sixth street on the right which will be the second Kildare Drive.

(Kildare Drive makes a loop) Take a right and Cliff's house is the 3rd house on the right.

2 parts polyurethane

1 part linseed oil.
