Finishing the Project

At the July program we will explore and demonstrate

various methods of finishing wood -We will call this program "Finishing the Project."

Dan Browning has become very accomplished with spraying lacquer and will discuss and demonstrate using this technique.

Other topics and demos will include making and applying 1-2-3

homemade hand rubbed finish, making wax for food safe woodware, filling grain in open grain woods and finishes that work well for outdoor applications.

Finishing is one of the most difficult and important parts of building a piece of furniture. Don't miss this program! In fact, you may want to bring a note pad.

After the meeting we are off to visit the shop of Walter Barnett (see page 3 for directions).

For some time now my father and I have been building a wooden boat. It's a 22 foot sailboat, gaff rigged. We have the hull all planked up, turned over, and on the trailer.


This project has been going on now for a long time and I am ready for it to be finished. I might take two years considering a project, making drawings, finding materials and the like, but once I start making chips I usually spend all my free time on it until it's finished and I'm pleased with it (I'm governed by the principal "let's get it completely done and get it out of here — I'm tired of looking at it").

My daddy (Charlie Ard, Jr.), on the other hand,

likes to drag a job out as long as possible. He'll have drawings for every part and every step down pat before he makes a single cut (he's governed by the principal "start slowly then ease off"). It probably comes from building telescopes where everything has to be precise.

He enjoys the actual cutting of wood and takes his time on every one (that sweet sound of the table saw and router). His parts usually fit the first time.

We have really had very little friction on this project despite our different ways and the boat is looking nice. When we get sails made it will look so good we will both be inspired to finish it.

Flag Cases


Jim Anchors continues to work on those flag cases for the family members of the people that lost their lives on September 11th.

Walter Barnett's Shop

During the shop visit to **Walter Barnett**'s might be a good time to get some helpful hints as to what projects might be good entries into our annual juried show. **Walter**, show chairman, would be an excellent person to ask for advice.

Directions: Exit from I-459 at exit 6 (Morgan Rd or Bessemer/Helena exit) If traveling south/west on I-459 take Morgan Road to the right toward Bessemer, if traveling north/east on I-459 take Morgan Road to the left toward Bessemer. Go approximately 1/2 mile to a traffic signal at the intersection of Morgan Rd and Greenwood Road. Turn left on Greenwood Road. Go approx. 1/2 mile and cross over I-459. After crossing I-459, the first street to the right is Pleasant Hill Road. 6036 Pleasant Hill Road is approximately 1 mile on the right. Drive thru the gate at the back to the shop.


