Concerning Our New Equipment

For the benefit of those who have not heard, thanks to **Dale Lewis**, we received an unexpected grant from the Alabama State Council on the Arts in early December. There were conditions attached to the grant; the money was to be spent in 2006 and whatever purchased was to be put in service. To purchase equipment was our only reasonable choice and we needed to put it in service where we conduct classes, seminars and make community service projects. I negotiated an agreement with **Jim Lee** and **John Lawson** for installing the equipment in their shop. The details are below.

The Guild supplemented the grant with \$660 and, together, we were able to purchase a Bridgewood 12" jointer, a 12" Bosch sliding compound miter saw, a 10" Sawstop table saw and a 20" Grizzly planer. The equipment has been received and is in place in **Jim's** and **John's** shop.

Expecting not to have equipment for sometime in the future, we have no procedures in place concerning members using this equipment. **Cliff Daniels** and **John Lawson** have been given the responsibility to develop operating and safety certification procedures. **Walter Barnett** is investigating liability insurance issues. This process will take some time, so please be patient.

What we do know at this time is that

NO ONE WILL BE ALLOWED TO USE THE EQUIPMENT UNTIL TRAINED AND SAFETY CERTIFIED FOR EACH PIECE OF EQUIPMENT

Please cooperate with us on this issue!

Our agreement with **Jim** and **John** is the equipment will be available for classes, seminars, community service projects and for our members personal use *AFTER PARTICIPATING MEM-BERS ARE SAFETY CERTIFIED*.

Until we have our own building, for personal equipment use, *MEMBERS MUST MAKE AN AP-POINTMENT WITH JIM* for a time that does not interfere with the commercial operation of his shop. *Bill Shivers*

More Good News!

In addition to the equipment obtained through the grant from the Alabama State Council on the Arts, Norrell Heating and Cooling and Lenox Corporation have donated a 5-ton heat pump with an electric furnace for our proposed new building.

Also, **Harold Hall's** grandson has donated eightyfive very nice folding chairs to be used when we get into the new building.

<u>Our goal is in sight</u> – four members have brought forth additional opportunities for our building which are currently being investigated.
