WOODWORKING EDUCATION CENTER (WEC)

The weather has not cooperated so that we can complete the children appliances. The items are built and we are waiting for a dry day so we can spray them with white lacquer. The Thursday group also worked on the signs for the Boys Ranch on June 24 and July 1. We are awaiting information from the ranch to be able to complete the lettering. After completing the lettering the plan is take the signs to the ranch and stain and paint the letters.

Five of the boys from the ranch came to the WEC on 6/24/10 to observe how the signs are made. We plan to have the boys help in the staining and painting of the letters.

We are still in need of a good riding lawn mower. If you know of one please let us know.

A new circuit was installed for the air conditioner in the kitchen. It is now available for use but it is also an added expense when it is on, so use it only when needed.

The central dust collector is out of service again. Preliminary indications point to a mechanical problem with the motor. While the central dust collector is out of service please use the portable dust collectors on the equipment.

Please remember that much of the equipment should not be operated without a dust collector connected. The jointer, planer, table saws, drum sanders, and band saws (and possibly other items) should always have a dust collector connected to them when in operation.

Notes on the Library


