We will also recognize our the People's Choice Show Winner!!



AWWG Receives Grant

The Alabama Wood Workers Guild has received a grant from the Alabama State Council on the Arts in conjunction with the National Endowment for the Arts. These grants are awarded to nonprofit art organizations, schools, universities and many other community groups.

Our grant will be used to install digital enhancements to improve the quality of our education programs. This includes two large screen displays and a wireless video system. One video screen will be placed in the classroom. It will be used for classes and meetings, allowing those in the back to get a better view of demonstrations, etc. The other video screen will be placed in the shop. Once again this will allow better visualization of demonstrations.

The equipment has been purchased and plans are underway for installation.

Thank you to Sandra McMillan and David Erikson who have worked hard to make this happen. This is a great way to enhance our wood working education programs

- ⇒ The Hand Tools Group has almost completed the front door for the WEC
- ⇒ A small jointer has been purchased and will soon be installed when we determine a suitable location
- ⇒ The roll up garage door leaks during heavy rains. This problem will be addressed by adding an extension to the existing threshold and adding new panels and gasket on the door.
- ⇒ We ask the people that use supplies such as pencils, blue tape, glue brushes please donate some replacement items as these supplies are used for classes. Also a donation of some plastic containers that could be used for finishing work, is greatly appreciated.
- ⇒ When using the various sanders, please check the sandpaper before and after using sanders for dirty, worn or torn sandpaper. Also please clean the sandpaper after using sanders.
- ⇒ As always, please leave notes for the shop management about any equipment malfunction, other maintenance issues and any supplies needed. These notes should be written on the clip board near the sign in log.

In the sweltering heat of August, fourteen members of the 2018 Cabinet Build Class met up at the Woodworkers Education Center to begin their journey of discovery and building skills in cabinet making. Led by instructors Bob Moore and Cliff Daniels. The ultimate goal was to create the upper and lower Kitchen Cabinets and two Bathroom Vanities to be installed in the Habitat for Humanity - ABC 33/40 Holiday Home in December.

This year's Holiday House would become the new home for the Gray Family in Irondale. The team gathered together one last time in mid-December and braved the cold, wet Saturday morning to travel out to Irondale for the finishing touches to this year's class.



The Holiday House was dedicated in a ceremony held by Habitat for Humanity and ABC 33/40 and the keys were turned over to Ms Gray and her sons on December 13th. It was so heartwarming to meet the family and to see and hear all of the good things said about the home and about the fine work done by the Guild Class who produced such a warm and cozy kitchen. It should also be noted that Lynn Smith not only help lead the installation efforts but also fashioned a set of bookshelves for the family, all part of the Welcome Home package Habitat and Sponsors provided.

Hand Tool Group

The Hand Tool group is off to a good start this New Year with our first gathering on the 3rd of January. Our “official” meeting time is every Thursday evening with all power tools turned off at 5:00 (although a lot of folks arrive around 3:00 to get things ready for the evening). We leave about 7:30 and find a place to eat. We have been called the “sand and supper group”.

We’ve planned an exciting year of projects both as group projects and individual projects.

If you are new to woodworking you’ll find this group is a great way to learn fundamental skills. Ray Ziegler is heading our focus on New Member Orientation with a curriculum of projects to help you develop skills and create tools you can use. Some examples are: a box to hold chisels, winding sticks, shooting board, bench hooks, tool tote, and dovetail marking gauge. The curriculum will also include how to sharpen all your hand tools (planes, chisels, saws, etc.)

If you have the basic skills but would like to hone them with more hand tool work, you will enjoy projects we plan to build just for that purpose. Henry Raymond is heading a project to build a Shaker Step Stool. Bob Baumgartner takes on building a wooden straight edge in the Paul Sellers style. Ray Ziegler heads building a Framing Square and Try Square from wood.

We have several group build projects for items needed in the WEC. Check out the solid oak front door that we are building and will replace the right front door at the WEC. Mike Key is leading a project to build a dedicated Sharpening Bench for our diamond stones and our Veritas guides. Kenneth Graham is leading a project to build a Saw Till to hold and display our many hand saws. Steve Stutts will be leading a Refinish of our kitchen table.

Van Phillips is heading one of our service projects this year building several of the “Little Free Libraries”, and we’re investigating other service projects similar to what

Luthier Group

The  Luthier Group is off to a great start for another year of stringed instrument making.

This would be a great time to join in the fun of making your own instrument.



We meet on Monday evenings from 5:00 to 9:00. The format for the group is simple. Three projects are underway now with folks working at their own pace with help as needed. As of now, we’ve worked on projects include ukuleles, mandolins, cigar box guitars, acoustic guitars and dulcimers, as well as a violin restoration.

This past year we started accumulating needed luthier tools and are in a pretty good position to tackle most any project. We have a good source for mahogany and Sapele thanks to a dumpster diver (although he won’t divulge his source). We also have some really nice hardwood flooring (American Cherry, Brazilian Cherry/Jatoba, Brazilian Koa/ Goncalo Alves that we have been able to use. If you are new to instrument making this is a great way to learn the basics in a low-cost manner.


Introduction to Carving Class Feb 2nd and 3rd

We all have access to free and cheap wood. Off-cuts, pallet wood, scrap wood, share box and the off-cuts box at the shop are just a few sources. This class is about learning new skills to utilize scrap wood (or you could use premium wood, at a cost). There is a learning curve to simple and complex wood carving and the starter tools are \$\$\$\$. Premium "Swiss" carving chisels start at \$40 per chisel/gouge at Woodcraft. Anything less than Swiss is just a poor inferior replacement. Swiss chisels/gouges come already sharpened and ready to use. No sharpening required right out of the package.



On the first day, Saturday 9 am to 1 pm, we will take a simple, cheap or free piece of wood and teach how to make a useful spoon or spatula. The instructor will furnish expensive chisels/ gouges and wood to carve a simple spoon or spatula. This way the student can get the feel for quality tools and decide if investing in your own tool roll is worth it. We will learn a safe method for using super sharp tools to carve the bowl of a spoon. With shapers, scrapers and sanding we will get a quality spoon dish. Then shaping and finishing will be done with simple tools. We will have 4 hours for everyone to complete a spoon or a spatula. If you already have carving chisels/gouges, bring them. We will discuss sharpening and maintaining a razor-sharp edge.



On the second day, Sunday 1-5 pm, we will learn how to produce a simple diamond pattern molding that has a variety of uses. This method of carving uses a ruler, pencil, tri-square and a common wood chisel to make the molding. In the class, we will require that everyone have a 5/8" or 16 mm wood chisel (the instructor has only ONE 5/8" wood chisel in his tool roll!!!!). We can discuss doing a group buy at \$8 each. First, we will learn how to sharpen a chisel to a razor-sharp edge, in 20min (1-2 hrs). Then, wood will be provided and we will learn to lay out and cut the molding with our sharp chisel (1-2 hrs). We will discuss sanding and finishing.

This class will be \$50 and Steve will be in touch with everyone when they sign up on the guild website. This class will serve as an "introduction to carving" and the skills learned will fit into a beginners class in relief carving (if there is interest) where each student will need to have their own set of tools (borrowed is OK). This beginner's class will follow the **Mary May** method of relief carving with free videos on YouTube. (Steve Stutts leuken@yahoo.com)
