RENEWING YOUR AWG MEMBERSHIP BEGINS OCTOBER 1ST

On October 1st we will start collecting dues to renew your AWG Membership for 2025. After many years of annual dues being \$100, dues have been raised to \$150, as voted on by the membership in April of 2024. As before, your spouse can also be a member at no additional cost. Also, as before, full time students will be eligible for a discounted student rate of 50% of the Individual Rate.

There are three option an individual can use to renew their AWG Membership for 2025.

- 1. Online at https://wp.awwg.info/ under Join or Renew. You will select the type of membership you are renewing, either "Regular Membership" or "Parent/Guarding & Youth Membership". The application is very straight forward. Just be sure to accurately give all the information requested. After completing the application, you will be taken to a PayPal page where you can pay with your PayPal account or a credit card. Note: This is the preferred method, however, full time students wanting the discounted rate need to renew their AWG Membership at the WEC using Option 2 or 3.
- 2. Using the "2025 AWG Membership" envelope. These envelopes are located at the WEC on the glass display cabinet in the kitchen. Just PRINT CLEARLY all the information requested on the envelope, place cash or a check inside the envelope, and then give the envelope to the Shop Supervisor. The Shop Supervisor will review the information given on the envelope to ensure all the information has been completed before he inserts the envelope (with payment) in the slot of the locked drawer. Some important information that is requested (and needed) on the envelope but in the past is frequently left blank or overlooked:
 - * Date
 - * Not checking the information in the current directory to verify if the information has changed.

 Note: If there are no corrections to be made, those lines can remain blank.
 - * Not giving the name of your spouse if the spouse does <u>not</u> want to be an AWG Member. In the AWG Directory we give the name of the spouse. If the spouse is not an AWG Member, all we need is their name. If you are married and prefer not to give the name of your spouse, please just write "Blank" after "Spouse Name".
 - * Ensure that if you are giving your Cell Phone Number, that you are filling in the blank after Cell Phone. Based on the envelopes I received, I am surprised at the number of people who do not have a cell phone or elect not to give their cell phone number.
- 3. Using the "Alabama Woodworkers Guild Membership Application". This is the yellow tri-fold brochure located by the front door. Just like using the 2025 AWG Membership Envelope, PRINT CLEARLY all the information requested and give the application and cash or check to the Shop Supervisor. The Shop Supervisor will insert the application with payment in the slot of the locked drawer. Note: I prefer you use the Membership Envelope rather than this application.

If you have any questions about renewing your 2025 AWG Membership, I will be happy to answer them.
