Habitat Cabinet Class is underway

Habitat for Humanity Cabinet Build Class August 23rd, 2025 9:00am-4:00pm Cost \$100.00

Each year the Guild builds kitchen cabinets and bathroom vanities for a Habitat for Humanity Holiday House. This class will take you through the complete steps of building cabinets, from face frames, carcass construction, doors, dovetailed drawers, finishing, and installation in the home. You work in teams of 4-5 people and everyone gets to do every step of the project. Starting the end of August and finishing with installation mid December, the class will meet once or twice a month to complete the cabinets.

Class 1 - August 23, 2025 - Orientation and Face Frame Build Class 2 - September 13, 2025 - Drawer Boxes

Class 3 - September 27, 2025 - Doors and Drawer Fronts Class 4 - October 25, 2025 - Carcass Construction

Class 5 - November 8, 2025 - Spray Finish

Class 6 - November 22, 2025 - Attach Doors, Drawers, and Pulls

Class 7 - Early December - Installation of Cabinets at Holiday House Class 8 - TBD - Holiday House Dedication

Award Medallions

The show is judged each year. The judges award 1 – 10 points based on four categories – workmanship, design, finish, and difficulty – for a maximum total of 40 points. The judges give valuable critiques, both pro and cons, to help each woodworker improve their skills. First, second, and third place medallions are awarded in each skill and open category.

In addition to the medallions three other awards are given. The Judges' Choice Award is given to the member whose entry is deemed best of show by the judges. It is bestowed at the end of the judging day. The winning entry is moved to a special table where it is placed next to the award.

The second award is the People's Choice Award. During the show visitors pick up a ballot as they tour the show. They then vote for their favorite entry. Votes are counted after the show and the award is given at our next meeting.

The third award is our newest award. It is the Children's Choice Award. Children get to look and handle entries in a special challenge geared towards them. (This year it's the toy challenge) Each child gets a ballot and votes for their favorite entry in that challenge. The entry with the most votes is awarded the Children's Choice Award at our next meeting.

AWG Show Rules

All entries must be mostly made of wood.

Exceptions: General hardware such as hinges and handles

Pen hardware

Instrument hardware

Tool hardware

Inlay – metal, stone, glass, acrylic, etc.

No motors or lights.

All entries must be 100% your work.

Categories and skill levels may be changed at the show committee's discretion.

The show committee will decide placement of each entry in the show.

COMMENTS

In an effort to help determine what category a project should be entered into, the following comments have been listed below:

1) All projects in which the lathe was the primary equipment used should be entered into the "Wood"

Turning" category.

example: Bowls, turned vessels with lids, and candle sticks.

2) A project which contains work done by a CNC Router or CNC Laser should not always be placed in the

category "CNC - Router, Laser".

A project should be entered in the "CNC - Router, Laser" category if the main attribute of the project

was done using a CNC.

example: Lithophanes from photographs

The project should not be entered in the "CNC - Router, Laser" category if the CNC was just one of the

tools used to make the project.

example: The use of a CNC to make a part in a piece of furniture.

3) The "Toy" category is intended for those projects which are made with the intent they will be played

with.

example:

A delicate model of a tall ship which was made to sit on a shelf and admired is not considered a toy and should be entered in the "Miscellaneous" category.

4) The "Miscellaneous" category is for those projects which do not belong in any of the other categories

Example: Cutting boards

MAKE YOUR PROJECT MORE INTERESTING AND HELP THE JUDGES EVALUATE YOUR PROJECT

Since you are entering your project into this Annual Show, I am sure you are proud of the project you

have created. If those looking a your project are like me, they will like to know more information about

it. The following is some of the things you could tell about your project. I am sure there are more.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

- 1.) Start with a simple description of the project to ensure the forms are with the correct project.
 - 2.) What is unique about this project?
- 3.) Did you use any special techniques? 4.) How many pieces are there? 5.) What finish did you use? Judges will want to know about this.

This is especially applicable for intarsia pieces
Judges will want to know about this.

WOOD USED:

- 1.) List the species of wood used. (i.e. Walnut, Maple, etc.)
- 2.) Is there a back story from where this wood came from?
 - 3.) Was this wood repurposed?

ENTRANT'S COMMENT:

- 1.) Did you make this project for any special reason?
- 2.) Is there something about this project that you are particular pleased with?
- 3.) Was there something that was particularly challenging in making or finishing this project?

- 3.) Open the download in Excel. At the top of the screen, click on "enable editing". That will enable to fill in the form and print it. You have to manually fill in all the appropriate cells on BOTH pages.
- 4.) There two pages to each entry form. The entry form and the judges' form. Both pages MUST be completed.
- 5.) Print BOTH pages SEPARATELY. And bring them with your entry to the WEC on Thursday, October 9, 2025 from noon till 7pm.
- **If you do not have Excel there are hard copy of the forms available at the WEC on the glass display cabinet in the WEC kitchen. There will also be blank forms available at show check-in.

REINDEER CRAFTING CLASS

Reindeer Crafting Class Brings Holiday Cheer and Guild Camaraderie

August 15, 2025 - Guild Workshop

On August 9, guild member Wally Duncan led a hands-on woodworking class focused on crafting decorative reindeer, combining skill-building with holiday spirit and a touch of nostalgia.

Originally inspired by a 2023 project made for his daughter in Nashville, Duncan revived the reindeer-making this year after a brief hiatus due to health reasons. The idea evolved into a workshop to share the joy — and the craft — with fellow guild members.

Participants Karen C. and Geoff W. attended the class, which began with a warm welcome and discussion on the uses of the reindeer — as thoughtful gifts or festive home decor. Emphasis was placed on safety, proper use of shared guild supplies, and the spirit of collaboration.

Duncan had pre-milled wood stock ready, and each student selected their piece before moving through various woodworking stations: dado saw, drill presses, bandsaw, and finally, extensive sanding. By day's end, each participant completed a reindeer and a reusable template for future projects.

The class not only provided a fun and educational experience but also raised \$50 for the guild. A "show and tell" of the completed projects is scheduled for the September membership meeting.

"I'm proud to have shared this project," said Duncan. "We had a lot of fun, and it's always great to spread skills, refine old ones, and raise a little revenue for the guild — all while enjoying each other's company."

Additionally, during the August 2025 membership meeting, Duncan provided a briefing on the Comfort Bird class held on July 5. Certificates of appreciation were created for all four students. With only Karen C. present at the meeting, Guild President Rick Ford personally presented her certificate.
