What a wonderful show we had. Thirty—one members had one or more items to exhibit, with the total number amounting to one—hundred twenty—one items. We had a surprising number of visitors who ambled in

and around the pieces setting on the floor and took long and appreciative looks at the smaller items on tables. The clocks, jewelry boxes, bowls, toys, croupier sticks, carvings, sculptures were just so outstanding, even the members were impressed with your talents. The Hoover Mall was transformed into a lovely gallery which some of our members who had not placed anything in the show were amazed at what had been done by you people. There were original productions and reproductions represented among the dining tables, end tables, coffee tables, hall tables, hobby table, cabinets, chairs, and even a work bench. We had visitors who wanted to buy our pieces, but since we were not selling during the show, there were probably some who made arrangements to do so after the close of the show. The workers performed their tasks with efficiency and dedication, as they always do. It would not be possible to have a show such as this without your help with setting up in the morning, baby sitting it during the day, and storing the show in a secure place over night. On Saturday, the last day, four of our members performed live demonstrations: Ivan Kronberg, carving; Frank Jones, dove-tails and cambriole legs; and Dale Lewis/Michael Key, bowl turning. 
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
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
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DOOR PRIZE

SHOW AND TELL

We had quite a variety last month. First, Jerry DeVaney brought a wooden belt buckle hoping someone could identify the wood — no one could. Ivan Kronberg brought another of his artistic pieces — a mallet made of maple and walnut. It is too pretty to use. Ben Angwin showed us three things: his homemade adjustable screws clamps made from threaded rods and nuts; a chammy skin as a base for placing a small piece on to rout and a piece of carpet pad for the same purpose. Keep bringing 'em in, men.

KERRY'S ANTIQUES

Maintaining his reputation for showing us a few of his antique tools, Kerry brought a few hand planes. There was the plane with a convex bottom, made of wood (the bottom, that is); the Victor (now Stanley) with both convex and concave metal bottoms; then the most unusual of all, a plane frame with removable wooden soles, and blades, with various degrees of convex and concave radii. This last plane came in a wooden box with a well for the frame and slots for the soles and blades, Thanks, so much, Kerry.

Sears Craftsman, ½" wood shaper, with twelve cutters, plus other accessories, used very little, for \$275 (about half current store price). Also, three rigid arm scroll saws. One is 18" Sears heavy duty, model 103.23150, for which parts are still available; another is similar with 20 inch capacity. Both of these need parts involving blade guide, holders and/or reciprocating rod. The third one is light duty, 12", good operating condition. These three are \$25. each, to a good home. SHOP TIP

Charles Brown advises, to remove cooked—on pitch and resin from saw blades and router bits he has tried commercially available pitch remover, kerosene, paint thinner, lacquer thinner, MEK, alcohol, naptha, and acetone, along with a lot of soaking and brushing. None of these worked too well, but he has found that spray—on oven cleaner makes them sparkling clean, as new. He has used "Easy Off," but supposes any similar product would also do the job.
