He will be talking about these, window shutters, and woodworking in general. Ben is a very talented woodworker and you certainly don't want to miss this meeting.

KERRY'S ANTIQUES

We are glad to have Kerry McCalla back in form again and showing us some of his fabulous collection. This month, July 1989, it was braces and bits. History records the first braces and bits in the first century, so apparently they had need for holes a long time ago. It was a good many centuries later, however, that sophistication crept into art. Coach and wagon makers found a need for a brace with interchangeable bits since it proved cheaper to have one brace and a lot of bits instead of a brace for each bit. The bits in that day fitted a slot in the front end of the brace

and when that became a problem the Spofford Chuck was invented. It had a thumb screw to hold the bit in place while in use. Then in, or about, 1864, the Barber chuck with alligator jaws was invented in America. So, the next time you get your brace and bit out just remember our ancestors used a similar tool.

SHOW AND TELL

This feature of our monthly meetings continues to be of interest. We wish more of you, however, would bring some of your work for the rest of us to see. It is not the purpose to criticize the work but to get ideas about form and techniques. Mike Key, who has really advanced rapidly in woodturning this year brought three small bowls, and very nice ones, too; Harold Phillips, an ole (not old) Pro showed a huge bowl from segments of walnut—it might be added Harold has a bowl turning lathe he and a relative made; Leonard Sanders brought one bowl made of an oak burl (hard as a rock), a bowl of spalted maple, a bowl of redwood burl, and salad tongs made of oak.

THE JULY PROGRAM

James Ewing, one of our members and a professional woodworker, brought us our program. James' talent with wood was apparent from his demonstration of some of the tools he has made. If he is as good at producing for his clients as he is at making many of his own tools, we understand why he is so successful. In addition to the tools he brought to show, he donated a book on toolmaking to our library. Some of the tools

he has made are bow saws (large and small), try squares (he has several so he can scatter them all over the shop and not have to look for one when he needs it), a 45° compass, a duck bill scriber, cam pressure clamps, screw clamps, a hand plane, a veneering hammer, and a circle cutter for a band saw. 

DOOR PRIZE


For having remembered to sign in, and thereby recording his attendance, Jerry DeVenny was awarded for his efforts with a carpenter's square.
