### NEXT PROGRAM JANUARY 13TH • 7:00 PM

We are sure each of us has attended craft and art shows without realizing what all is involved in being an exhibitor. So what is involved? How do you know when and where a show will be held? How much does it cost to get space at a show? How much space does one need to show his particular breed of craft? What happens if at the last minute you have to withdraw? Do you have to share your proceeds with the sponsor? Do you have to collect sales tax on what you sell? Do you have to secure a Sales Tax ID Number if you show your things for sale? In other words, what is showing your works for sale in a show all about. Well now is your chance to find out. Two veterans of the shows are Ethel Owens and Dale Lewis and there isn't much about this activity they don't know. They will be sharing this information with us in January so come and get the answers to those above and those you want to ask.

#### LAST MEETING • NOVEMBER 1993

It has been so long since this meeting you all may not remember much about it. Well, it was a good one. The program consisted of demonstrations of the use of router tables by several members of the Guild and the lead-off demonstrator was Mike Key. Mike made rails and stiles for cabinet doors and then made the door panel, with shaped edges, and as if wonders would never cease they all fit together nicely. Ed Sheriff came along with his Rube Goldberg router table (hope he isn't offended by the description). Ed's table is a multi-purpose table, but he restricted his demonstration to slot mortising. This exercise deals with cutting slots in the mitered corners of a picture frame, for example, into which would be inserted a biscuit. Or, you can insert a spline if you wish. Wallace Williams showed us how to rout rockers for a child's chair, using a pattern of plywood to rub the collar of the router bit. He also had a jig for edging the rockers and, additionally, how to cut a slot in an arch. Bob Moore demonstrated you don't have to have a monstrous router table to rout. He has one that uses a Dremel router and can do small mortises and tenons as well as kitchen cabinets, book shelves and signs. He showed us how to position a slot in a shelf with a T square and he uses a Moto Tool to do round-overs. It was an excellent program and our thanks to you participants.

#### **CHRISTMAS PARTY**



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
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
