Tool Tips

Tip #1:

When ever buying lumber, no matter how gorgeous it looks, put it on the ground to check for warps and turns. I guess you always learn this the hard way. I recently bought a beautiful piece of maple and worked an entire weekend on it because it was warped.

Tip #2:

When dealing with warped boards the following kind of help:
1) plane the sucker as much as you can. 2) if there's an area that won't show use a relief cut. 3) if either 1 or 2 fail use said board for kindling.

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
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
