Next Program - March 1997

He has designed and built a turning lathe and many other tools and mediums of mechanical assistance. His topic will be planes and scrapers. He will demonstrate the use of these two tools preparatory to sanding (or as he puts it Plane Geometry). He says it is possible, sometimes, to plane and scrape in lieu of sanding. We are sure the type wood and its condition would have to influence this procedure. Anyway, we look forward to your program, Charlie.

Last Month's Program

Even though it was cold as a

WDA in the meeting room, Dale Lewis and Nelson Brooks did a superb job of indoctrinating us as to the use and uses of sandpaper. Nelson tackled the various types of sandpaper available, their applications and their costs. Mentioned were: resin bond, glue bond, aluminum oxide, silicon carbide and ceramic aluminum oxide. Some of us were not aware there are so many available and now that we know this we will have a hard time deciding which one to use. Then came Dale who introduced us to several types of sanding machines. The portable belt sander (3" belts) is widely used by us amateurs and does a fine job until you have a table top to do. For that you need the PERFORMAX table sander (\$900) which will sand a 16" board, or a 32" table top if the top is turned around. The oscillating/revolving spindle has made sanding curved objects much easier. Fighting dust was mentioned, and it was suggested that we wear protective masks to protect our lungs when sanding. We appreciate Dale and Nelson doing the program.

Woodworking Classes

Continuing our commitment to making membership in the Guild as meaningful as possible, we have, over the years, held instructional classes in woodworking. These classes have always been well attended and presented in an outstanding manner. Fred Baker, who has conducted several of our classes, has engaged the assistance of Mike Key (also a past President) and together will be the instructors for the classes. They will run nine weeks beginning May 5 through Saturday, June 28 from 9:00 AM to 12:00 noon. The subjects to be covered are:

- 1. Machines and Safety
- 2. Sharpening and tool care
- 3. Wood selection, layout and glue-up
- 4. Hand tools
- 5. Joinery dado, tongue and groove, mortise and tenon


