how to entertain our Guild, and he has done so on several occasions and this promises to be another in his string.



Tip

Being primarily a turner, I your editor, subscribe to *Woodturning* a British publication. It is most enlightening and has many provocative as well as informative articles each month. The following *Tip* is from the March 1997 issue and may solve the problem for us of cutting a log when our vise is either too small or the log is just too big.



Bench clamp for cutting logs

Trying to build up my wood stock, I used a wooden horse for cutting logs into usable sizes with the Bosch 'Tyrannosaw.' But how to cut logs into billets in a safe and secure way became a problem.

The bench clamp shown works well for this. It can also be used for cutting by hand or power saw.

As I work at an oil refinery, getting scrap for my clamp was easy, but most engineering firms should be able to supply the parts.
