Next Program - May 14, 1998

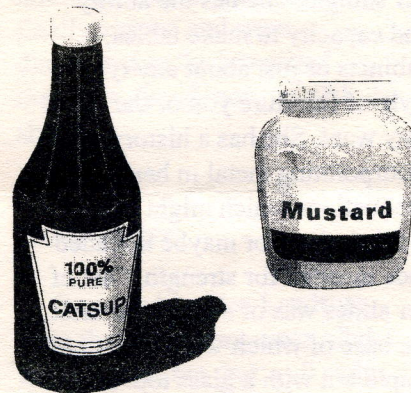
We are a little hesitant about how much to say about our next meeting because we are sure our extinguished President will have a lot to say in his message. But here goes, anyway. This will be a fun

She has the ability and capacity to make tables, cabinets or just about any type or style of furniture you or the client may want. She has a history of incorporating metal in her productions which might be welded plates or maybe threaded rods inserted for strength. One of her slides was of a beautiful table, the base of which was walnut and maple but with a glass top. She had one slide of an all metal table, and she said it takes two men and a boy to lift it. She emphasized, and this is something we in the Guild can benefit from, when accumulating material for a project don't skimp on buying the best material you can afford because it will pay off in the long run. One additional note, from the pictures she showed us, it is obvious she has been around Dale Lewis enough to have been infected with his artistic love for the unusual and his propensity for quality work. 3-M Sandpaper

You have received recently a packet of several grades of 3-M Sandpaper in the mail, all as a result of our President's convincing them we would use their sandpaper and afterward would complete a questionnaire as to how well it performed and our opinion of it. They have written asking "where are the questionnaires?" If you have tried it and have an opinion, please comply with their request so our President won't be hung out to dry if we don't.

Rolling Library

We have been told, again, that the library cabinet will indeed be put on wheels so it may be rolled into our meeting room and thereby be more convenient to our members. Just in case some of our newer members don't know it, we have many reference books, periodicals and other material available for your reading and research pleasure. For instance, you have never made a table from scratch, right? There are several books and magazines in the library that will describe in detail how to make the legs, skirt, drawer (if wanted) and the top. It will show you how to make mortise and tenon joints to attach the legs to the skirt. It will show you how to attach the top to allow for movement of the wood to avoid checking (cracking) and everything else you need to know. So, seek out Frank Jones (who probably will have a hot dog hanging out of his

mouth) and get him to assist you in securing the right book for your project.

Dean Black's Shop

You have heard of Dean many times in our GUILD NEWS. He could easily be considered a member of our GUILD, as he has visited us so many times. He has presented our program a number of times and is always received by our members with wonder and appreciation. You probably have never seen a shop quite like his. He has (at last count) seven (7) lathes up and running and available for whatever he needs to do. One of his lathes is about 20 feet long, and he has used it to turn porch columns, for one thing. He has a bowl lathe that will accommodate about an 8' in diameter bowl blank. This machine is anchored to the concrete floor in such a way it could never get away. He also is a gunsmith, and has a metal lathe he uses to make gun barrels. We would estimate the floor space of his shop to be about 40' by 100'. His inventory of wood, bowl blanks (some enormous) will blow your mind. But, you see, Dean is a professional and as

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such has to have whatever it takes to meet the client's needs. If you happen to visit the Art Museum for any reason, ask where the Japanese exhibit is. You will see about eight walnut columns, about 10" in diameter, some 12' tall, and sitting on appropriate round (turned) bases, a smaller one resting on the bottom one. This man lives an interesting life surrounded by his shop, his lovely wife who is an artist, and his gallery where he sells his wife's paintings and his bowls and whatever else he has made for sale. You must put this on your calendar for May 30th, from 10 - 2. Bring a brown bag lunch and be prepared to enjoy every minute of it. As for road directions, you go up I-59 to the Springfield exit (about 40 miles) and go to the first stop sign, turn left for a couple of blocks and his building is easily seen on your right. If you have any other questions, ask your officers at the May meeting (they will be feeding their faces too) about your concerns.
