Next Program— November 12, 1998 · 7:00PM

All of you are going to enjoy this "program." Instead of an instructional program, we are going to bring our toys for the TOYS FOR CHILDREN annual undertaking. If you have not been at our November meeting before, you are in for an astonishing surprise. Last year we had some 800 toys at that meeting, and milling around amongst them was inspiring as well as entertaining. It is almost unbelievable the variety of toys our members come up with and the astounding quality of them. Of course, if you haven't made any yet, the inventory will be short of what you didn't make. However, we know that is not the case because every year we have more and better quality toys than the year before. Now, we want you to bring the family with you. We want everyone to enjoy these toys before we turn them over to the hospitals. Plans call for some light refreshments while you are milling around among the hundreds of toys in total disbelief. This will rival our Christmas party to some extent but not surpass it so, by all means, plan to attend our November meeting and see what can be done with a piece of wood.



Last Program— October, 1998

Gerald Story, a South Central Bell employee, originally from Mobile but now of Pell City, told an interesting story of making Duck Decoys. He makes them from a block of Tupelo Gum, a wood that is hard to find. He gets his from Buchanan Lumber Co. in Mobile, and the blank measuring some 6" square and 15" long costs \$35. He said those blanks used to go for about \$5, but when the hobby of making decoys from them exploded a few years ago the price shot up. A pattern is drawn on the side of the block for the profile view of the duck, and a pattern is drawn on the top of the block for the other view. Just as when cutting out carbriole legs, when you cut the side view on the band saw you must tape or tack the piece just cut off back in its original place, then you may cut out the top profile. When you have done this correctly, you have some scraps that you may dispose of and what remains is a roughed-out duck decoy. He recommends that you work with the wood while it is still green because the older it gets and dries out the harder it becomes. Naturally, as any fool can plainly see, green wood that is still soft will carve easier than hard wood. He uses an electric carving machine (either FOREDOM or DREMEL) to carve some of the minute details and then turns to a burning tool to create the

feathers. He is not producing many right at this time, but plans to resume as soon as he can. He added that some of the carvers use white cedar but he still prefers Tupelo Gum. Thanks, Gerald.


