He was a true gentleman and a good example for all of us to follow when our time comes.

The last time I saw Jack he was giving a day of his time (and he knew well how few he had left to give) to teach a troop of scouts some woodworking. Jack had designed a little truck that carried a box of crayons and each boy built one and donated it to the hospital. That is typical of the many unselfish things he did.

So, farewell monsieur Jaques Perreé, may your many kind works be repaid ten times over, may your example serve to make us better men, and may you have as many good friends in heaven as you did on earth.

Next Program - March 8, 2001 - 6:30

We will be pleased to welcome Mr. Mike Davis to our meeting. Mike is a native of Birmingham; moved to Huntsville where he learned to do woodworking from his father and grandfather; then moved to Mobile and continued this pursuit; and since 1989 has lived in Alabaster. Mike is employed by Rust Engineering, and his wife, Arlene, is also a woodworker. He prefers to work with mahogany and walnut, and his presentation at our meeting will be demonstrated on the band saw and scroll saw.

Last Program

Since Charlie was in Paris, France at the time of our meeting, it fell to Cliff Saxon, Vice-President, to preside and maintain order. He did a fine job and we appreciate him, and all the other officers, for doing such a good job.

It was a special occasion when we welcomed our old friend Dean Black to our meeting. Dean has been in and out of our meetings for many years and probably could be considered a member (if he would only pay his dues). It was equally nice to have Dean's wife, Sharon, as our guest. Since Frank Jones has known and has been associated with Dean for many years, Cliff asked Frank to introduce him. Dean had heard some of us talking about the lumber dealer in Prattville who is a specialist in cypress lumber, and shared with us he is building a new home completely out of cypress. Maybe he will have a "tea" or something and let us all tour and admire his new home when completed. Dean got started in woodworking making gun stocks, and to prove he can make them he had two rifles with him for us to admire. He has come a long way since making gun stocks, however, and lays claim to many sophisticated projects he has put his name to around Birmingham. He showed us some crosses he has made a few of (ladies wear them on a chain around their neck) and because of the unusual way they are cut, it makes them one of a kind. A little different sort of pursuit for a woodworker is the way he takes three or four welding rods, affixes them to a stationary base and

enlists the assistance of someone to hold a welding torch on the rods until they can be bent. While in that position he plats (braids) them into a pigtail which he then hammers flat on each side. From this structure, he makes belt buckles and other decorations. He has been commissioned to redo the Korean exhibition in the Birmingham Museum of Art, which he will start in September. One last thing, his turning lathes are so large he can accommodate huge burls safely. He now has one burl some 8' in diameter, and it took a front end loader and a dump truck to get it to his shop. He is quite a fellow, and we appreciate his coming from Springville into town at night to be with us.
