Next Program - April 12, 2001 - 6:30

Cliff Saxon seems to have read our minds. He knows how we are always having problems with our machinery and don't know what to do about it. He has come up with an answer. He has invited Warren Jones, an employee of Bo Thuston, to talk to us about this problem. Warren worked for the Carbide Tool Company in Atlanta for several years and has been working for Bo for seven years. He is intimately acquainted with woodworking equipment and will be willing to answer your questions about what to do about some problem you may be having with a piece of your equipment. Come prepared to ask questions.

Last Program

We are indebted, first to Cliff Saxon, and second to our guest speaker Mike Davis. It became obvious immediately that Mike knew what he was talking about when he launched into how to tune a band saw (bet you didn't know there is music in a band saw). These are the principal things you should attend to when tuning (adjusting) your band saw: check the weld where the blade is joined for smoothness; hone back corners of blade; wheels bearing the blade may be checked for accurate alignment with each other with a straight edge by testing to see if the wheels are in touch with the edge by all four (two wheels) wheel edges touching the straight edge; check tires for a crown, if present replace; check blade tension (springs weaken with age); after setting tension reset guides; there is a slit in every bandsaw table to enable you to insert a new blade - there is a pin, leveling the two sides and replacing

the pin; with a machinist square check to ensure the blade is 90° to the table; resawing is a ticklish procedure and space doesn't permit a full disclosure - instead, we refer you to FINE WOODWORKING MAGAZINE, Issue 95 for more on band saws. You may see Mike Davis at WOOD-CRAFT where he demonstrates on the bandsaw and the scroll saw. Now. speaking of the scroll saw, there are not as many problems to attend to as the band saw. However, be sure the scroll saw blade is perpendicular to the table, tension the blade properly with teeth pointing down and set the "hold down" as close to the wood as possible - just loose enough for the movement of the wood.

We say it twice for emphasis. This is an experiment we have borrowed from the Woodturners. they have had great success with their members bringing tools or materials they don't need and letting the woodturners auc-

tion them off to their members with the proceeds going into their coffer for the benefit of the association. We have tried it for two months with only moderate success. We believe all of us have tools we seldom, if ever, use or a piece of lumber we have no real need for or a machine stand, or a light fixture, or something just to make a little more room in our shops. Bring 'em in, y'all.

Suggestions & Tips

There are several really fine woodworking (no pun intended) magazines on the market, most of which depict methods of doing certain jobs in the shop or tips on how to correct or enhance some worrisome thing that keeps us from completely enjoying our time working in our shops. With this in mind, we offer a couple of ideas taken from one or more of these magazines:

We all encounter our glue bottle when the lid gets stuck to the neck or spout. Wax the threads and you will stop that.

If you work with black walnut at all, you know how hard it is to see the pencil lines we put on the material for cutting. Put chalk over the pencil line. The chalk will not cover the graphite, but will cover the space around the line thus making the line show even better.

You know how it is when you lay a round handled chisel on the work bench and it usually rolls off? Fix it by planing or sanding a flat strip on the side the flat of the blade is on and you stop the rolling off. By feel, know when you have the blade beveled side up.

We all keep mineral spirits in our shops for various reasons. We all know how the settlement goes to the bottom of the can. Set the can aside for a week or two and when you pour off the good spirits, you can then pour out the settlement.

If you have carving tools in a canvas roll, you probably have a rust problem. There are a couple of things you can do: soak your canvas roll in clear kerosene and let it dry; spray the roll with a silicone-base, water repellent fabric spray. This will solve your problem.

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
