Next Program

July 12, 2001 - 6:30 PM

Our V-P & Program Chairman,

Cliff Saxon has come up with a good one for July. He is Chad Harmon, manager of the local Makita outlet, and he is involved in home remodeling. Considering the two of his qualifications, tools and remodeling, he will have a most interesting and informative program. Ordinarily we have tried to stay away from esteemed peddlers but in this case the program is worth much more than a theory. With his association with Makita he knows the latest tools on the market and how they operate. Then using these tools in his remodeling business, he can tell us just what to expect from each tool.

Last Program - June 2001

Our expectations for a fine program were certainly fulfilled with the artistry of Richard Brewer. Our former member and Vice President certainly lived up to his advance billing. He shared a lot of information with us, like the veneer he was using is 1/28" thick (you can almost read a newspaper through it. When a tree is felled, a good and valuable tree, the best cuts (crotch, etc,) go to the veneer mill. making furniture out of solid walnut, cherry, mahogany or any other number of trees is far more expensive than veneering an MDF board or some other kind of substrate. If you want to match grain patterns, veneer is your

method of doing so. If you want to book match a figured grain, veneer is your game. What some of us may not have known is, when making a table top, you veneer both sides. After putting the good stuff on the top, you may put less expensive stuff on the bottom. This is supposed to give moisture and anything else a hard time trying to undo a beautifully veneered table or chest top. Now, we haven't mentioned how he (Richard) gets the veneer onto the subject. It is done with a vacuum bag. The one he demonstrated is home made by him and works just as well as the expensive models. He bought some heavy plastic and made it into an envelope; sealed one end of the bag leaving just enough room for the hose to be attached; then made a scissors-like device to seal the other end of the bag just before starting the vacuum; then he used a small pump and a gauge to measure the pressure. After spreading Weld Bond glue on the subject with a paint roller and smoothing the veneer on the substrate he placed the subjects in the bag, sealed the bag and turned on the pump. It only takes a few seconds to see the bag collapse on the subject and you know the even pressure needed to successfully veneer something is taking place.

Richard shared also with us how he takes pieces of veneer and trims the edges as needed. We certainly appreciate his preparing and delivering us this truly fine program.

Business

A small matter of business was conducted by Pres. Charlie. It was discovered that the wrong address was included in our by-laws dealing with ByLaw TWO. As stated, we are still at Acton's in Helena, in fact we are at Pres. Charlie's home address. There being a quorum of 25 members or more present a motion was made and seconded that, the ByLaw Two be corrected to reflect our present location. There were no dissenting votes.

A Seminar

The possibility of having a oneday seminar later in the summer or fall was discussed, and a show of hands confirmed there is sufficient interest to make plans toward such a seminar. A lot of interest has been expressed in having a seminar dealing with cabinet making, something most of us know very little about. Mancil is acquainted with a professional in Indiana who can and will put on a program for us if conveniently scheduled. This gentleman (not Indiana Jones) require would some travel expenses well as lodging and a fee for himself. So, as we have always done, we will have to charge an attendance fee from all who participate. Our record over the years has been outstanding, and we have had some notable demonstrators. This is what our Guild is all about, making woodworking fun (and in some instances, profitable). As we


more about this at the July meeting. By the way, July 14th is the date for the demo.
