In our next program, Charlie will show and tell us all about a 24" band saw and a wood lathe that he designed and built. They are both beautiful tools and I'm sure you will enjoy his presentation.

November Meeting Highlights

Dan demonstrated the low-tech way to create beautiful, intricate boxes using duct tape and a jig made from scrap lumber. Dan tells us that, "your way is the right way" or "whatever works for you."


What am I bid?



New Board Meeting Place


Our incoming president, **Dan Browning**, has found a new
