Hands-on Classes for 2006

All classes except Frank Jones' are Saturdays 8AM until noon.

Furniture Restoration and Refinishing Beginning May 27th **Harold Hall** will teach a 3 to 5 week hands-on class on restoration and refinishing furniture (limited to 8 students) Classes will meet at **Jim's** shop except the first meeting which will be held at **Harold's** shop where a stripping vat will be demonstrated. Each student can choose a project to work on and **Harold** will give guidance on completing the projects. Besides the projects, **Harold** will give demonstrations and discuss a wide variety of topics related to finishing and restoration. As of April 1st there were still slots available in this class.

The Scroll Saw Beginning April 22nd, **Cliff Daniels** will teach a 6 week hands-on class on the scroll saw (limited to 6 students) at **Jim's** shop. A repeat of the popular class **Cliff** taught last year, it covers selecting, maintaining, and safe operation of the scroll saw. Techniques of making several projects will be covered.

Change in Schedule!! It has become necessary to change the schedule for **Cliff's** Scroll Saw Class and **Harold's** class on Repair and Refinishing! The Scroll Saw Class will start April 22. If you have not already signed up for the class, do so Thursday night. **Harold's** class on Repair and Refinishing will start on May 27th. We hope this will not inconvenience anyone.

Building a High Style Table Beginning May 6th **John Lawson** will teach a 10 to 12 week hands-on class (limited to 6 students) on building a table with curved surfaces, veneering, inlaying and wooden hinges in **Buzz** and **Nelda's** shop. The students will work on a "class" table and it is expected that each student will build his/her own table at home along with the progress in class. Class intermediate to advanced

Frank Jones Classes (the first and second Saturdays each month begin at 9 AM.) **Frank** teaches walking stick classes in May and hand cut dovetails in June. In August **Frank** will teach carving ball and claw feet. **Frank** doesn't eat lunch but invites you to bring a sandwich and take a break if you would like.

Your Pledge and the Woodworking Center

Our January meeting was a milestone in the future of our Guild! It was the kick-off of our plans to have a Guild owned Woodworking Center. The plan provides for a complete woodworking center including a nicely equipped meeting facility, a gallery, a professional quality woodworking shop equipped with tools not likely found in the home shop, storage for wood and a small kitchen. The shop will be open a number of days each week for the use of our members at no cost to the member.

Through the efforts of **Lynn Smith**, we have the services of a professional fundraiser with fourteen years experience, Todd Heifner. Todd has laid out a three-step plan for our fundraising based on obtaining about 80% of the needed funds from foundations and philanthropists in the Birmingham area and about 20% from our members and other donations. The estimated cost of our facility is around \$650,000.

The major steps in Todd's plan are: 1) describe who we are, what do we need, and how much will it cost. This has been done. 2) perform a feasibility study by consulting with about forty of the foundations and philanthropists who are likely to donate to our program 3) through networking with our members and others, Todd will develop a list of about one hundred twenty foundations and philanthropists who are interested in projects like ours and together, Todd with one of us, will call on these groups and individuals to request their support.

One of the very important elements in securing support from others is showing the commitment of our own membership. The level of funds we need to raise is about \$120,000. The donations can be cash as well as cash-in-kind, such as services, material, equipment and etc. Although we have only recently started fundraising, we have about 20% of the cash or cash-in-kind we need to raise!

In the early stages, another important element is to have a commitment for location and land. Although efforts are underway, we don't yet have this commitment – your help is needed! **In a few days you will receive a letter requesting your pledge. You will be asked to make a pledge of your support either in cash or cash-in-kind** on the included form and to return it to our Treasurer, **Walter Barnett**, at the next meeting or if you are unable to attend the meeting, then mail it to **Walter**.

We know that not everyone will wish to support this effort at the same level but all donations are important. The form will allow your pledge to be paid in one payment or over three years to make it easier for you and to match our cash flow. Please consider what the Guild has meant to you, how the planned facility will be helpful to you and if YOU wish this facility to be a part of YOUR legacy as you complete and return the form at the next meeting.


