This month I want to talk about Education. For the past several years I have been the Education Director. I have been trying to develop classes that would appeal to most of the members at all skill levels. Last year I focused on shop projects. A workbench, a router table, a wall hanging tool cabinet, a table saw sled, along with turning classes and box making classes and a woodworking fundamentals class. Most of the classes were well attended and were well received.

This year we started with the fundamentals class followed by, a beginning carving class, a cam clamp class, a cutting board class, a hand plane restoring, sharpening and usage class, the cabinet on stand class with professional wood worker and author Michael Pekovich, Nicholson style workbench class, a pen turning class, a basic turning class, and a still to come daisy box class. And, of course, the annual Habitat for Humanity cabinet class.

So now it is time for me to plan our next years professional wood worker seminar. I have gotten some feed back that some members didn't take the class because they didn't like the project. Which was confirmed by the lack of participation in the follow-up build along class. The project in this seminar was a vehicle to demonstrate joinery, tips and techniques that will apply to many other of our projects. I started the build along follow-up sessions to put these tips and techniques to use before we forgot them.

This is where I need your help, I need your input on the kind of projects and names of professionals that you may want to see. What I always strive for is a seminar project and professional that will attract at least 25 participants.

The goal of this project is to motivate the patient through encouraging notes and provide them with an incentive to get out of bed. Feel free to include stickers or a small toy with your note".

I mentioned in February that we were building 6 ukuleles for Emily Macher who is a Certified NICU Music Therapist. She will use them as she teaches children with challenges.

Emily Macher is a board certified music therapist. She has worked as a music therapist in the Tuscaloosa City Schools for the last four years. She spends most of her time working with school aged students with special needs. Through music therapy sessions, the students are able to work on academic skills, communication skills, social skills, and improve physical coordination and range of motion, all while singing, playing instruments, and not necessarily realizing they are working. With this class set of ukuleles, students will be able to focus on fine motor skills, learn an appropriate leisure skill, express themselves through music, and perform in front of their peers.

Well, the ukuleles are all finished. We presented these instruments to Emily on May 9, 2019. Obviously she was thrilled with our efforts.—Van


The Annual Show
