

#### THE BAND SAW

back of the blade

- The size of a band saw is determined by the diameter of the wheels
- The lower wheel is the drive wheel and is fixed and not adjustable
- The upper wheel is adjustable to make sure the blade is tracking correctly
- Both wheels have tires on them the blade rides on the tires
- When adjusted correctly the blade should track in the center of the tire
- The saw has a set of blade guides. There is 2 sets of side guides above the table and below the table. There are also 2 back guides, one above and one below the table
- The side guides are for keeping the blade straight
- The back guides purpose is to keep the blade from going to far backward so the teeth do not get into the side guides ( the teeth and guides would be damaged if they did )
- All the guides are ceramic and will cause sparking at times
- The side guides should be adjusted to both sides of the blade but not quite touching and should be back so the blade teeth are not inside the guides
- The back guides should be brought up so they are just barely touching the
- These guide adjustments should be done both above and below the table
- During cutting the back guide will be touching the blade and will eventually create a grove in the guide ( there will probably be some sparking. Laguna recommends to rotate the back guide 15 degrees after each 8 hours of use. This is to keep the grove from getting too deep and the teeth getting into the side guides. Guides should be cleaned regularly and lubricated with Teflon-based lubricant
- New blades should have the back rounded
- Blade should be set at 90 degrees to the table
- Blades have different number of teeth per inch (TPI). The ones with less TPI are more aggressive and will cut faster. The higher number of TPI is less aggressive and will cut slower but will have a smoother surface after cutting. The thickness of the wood you are cutting will sometimes determine the TPI you want to use
- If a change of blade is needed and you have not done so before then get a Supervisor to show you how or have him do it for you
- During long periods of non use of saw the blade should be de-tensioned

#### **BEFORE TURNING ON THE SAW**

- Doors should be closed
- Blade guard under the table should be raised and locked
- Tension of blade should be set for the size blade used
- Blade guide lowered for the thickness of wood cutting
- Check or adjust all guides for size of blade used
- Check or adjust that blade is at 90 degrees to table
- Verify blade is tracking properly
- Once saw is running round the back of blade (this would only be required with a new blade)

CLASS: Tool Chest with Mike Pekovich

While a wall-mounted cabinet is a great way to store tools, it's not always the most practical solution. If you haven't set up shop yet, or need to frequently move your tools, then a tool chest might be a better way to go. A while back I had made a travel chest to take along when I teach, and it has become a home-away-from home for me. While protecting your tools is a big concern, a tool chest should also act as a work station allowing fast, easy access to the tools you need when you need them.

- Tips for dovetailing larger case parts.
- Accurate no-math layout for through mortise-and-tenons.
- Sawing and chopping through mortise-and tenon joinery.

- Making a frame-and-panel lid at the tablesaw.
- A fast method for hinging the lid.
- -Making a simple lid stay.
- Sizing and making a dovetailed drawer.
- A no-headache method for installing locksets.
- Organizing tools with partitions
- Simple shellac and wax finish
