President's Message

Secondly, we have adopted a new WEC Management structure. David Robinson is currently going a great job coordinating our Shop Supervisors. Randy Hjetland is doing great keeping our equipment maintained and operational. We are looking for someone to be our Supply Manager to keep up with supply inventories from sandpaper and glue to coffee and band aids. This person will be your contact if you notice a supply shortage.

We have started doing a long-term plan for maintaining our Physical Facility too. Last year we had an Engineer develop a plan for the overall maintenance of our building. You have noticed that the WEC was painted late last year, and we just completed installing new gutters to keep rain from running down our new paint job. I am happy to announce that Antonio Carballo has offered to be our Facility Manager and he will continue with the long-term planning, and budgeting for keeping the building in shape.

The last thing I want to do is add layers of bureaucracy to our operations. My intent is the opposite. If you see issues or have ideas, please reach out to the appropriate manager or committee chairperson and get the idea submitted. Then they can pull the right folks in to have a plan in place before the next Board meeting. 

Our mentorship program is new and improved! Do you have a desire to connect with someone that is proficient at a skill that you would like to learn? Check out our mentorship program on the website.



Bill Newman: Instructor-Mentor-Friend

On March 12, long time member **Bill Newman** assisted by **Gary Crosson** held a class on Parquetry and Marquetry. Bill is well known for his amazing talent of box building with Marquetry and Parquetry along with his dedication to continued mentorship and sharing his knowledge both in the Guild and in his home workshop.

As Bill describes in the class:



"Parquetry and Marquetry are decorative techniques often used on furniture and other wooden items. The usual materials are veneers, though other materials are sometimes

used. This introductory course will focus on using wood veneers for making geometric and artistic patterns for the decoration of furniture and other items. Marquetry and parquetry are often seen in Federal style furniture and in many items of modern furniture." Of course, like with so many other techniques - this can be used in many more ways - some of the students in the class mentioned plans of using it on ornaments and instruments.





Bill built his first 6 drawer chest when he was 14 years old. It was a simple chest and he

used cigar boxes for drawers. The simple chest that he made long ago is still in service holding fly-tying material for another of his hobbies.

He began building "fine" boxes in 1992, He made a French fitted case for his nephew who was in the navy and engaged in the first Gulf war. The case was for a cap and ball revolver. The case was made of mahogany with hand cut dovetails and was lined with leather to cushion the gun.



He has made more than 200 boxes of various types since then. He has also made furniture and some special purpose chests and cases.

Bill and Gary introduced the basics of:, construction of geometric patterns in veneer including creating a basic star, a nautical star, and the Louis Cube. Inlay banding and stringing along with a technique of scorching was discussed and demonstrated.

Like most of Bill's boxes and items that have been given away, Bill also gives much of his time in mentoring others. Through this time he not only shares the knowledge but influences others and develops friendships. Gary is a relatively new member of the Guild and began mentoring with Bill soon after joining - the bond they have was apparent during the class and both have expressed the appreciation for the friendship they have found through the craft they now share.
